LLML/COUNTY LIBRARY AGREEMENT SIGNED !

An agreement eliminating the fees previously charged Liberty Lake city residents for County Library cards and equalizing the access to resources at the two library systems was finalized on October 16, 2012, by the City of Liberty Lake and the Spokane County Library District. The agreement provides that LLML's non-resident cardholders will receive the same services as those given to Liberty Lake city residents at SCLD libraries. The terms do not extend to databases or ebook/audio book vendors, nor do borrowing privileges extend to any other library system with which LLML or SCLD may have other agreements. This means, for instance, that LLML non-resident cardholders will go to SCLD for downloadable ebooks and audio books. Further, non-residents may no longer request items owned by CIN libraries through the CIN catalog. Items LLML does not own may still be requested to be purchased or requested through inter-library loan from a non-CIN library.
